I just wanted to write to you to say thank you for all of your support and kind words over the past two weeks. I know that it has been a strange time for all and the new normal is a very different world. I am sure you have seen various memes and funny video clips about home schooling and I can definitely see a lot of truth mixed in with the comedy.

You are all doing a great job!

I have already passed on my gratitude to colleagues who have set up a virtual school from scratch in a very limited amount of time, despite the fact that many are also managing their own family situations. I am sure you will echo that.

Here are just a few key updates to finish the term:

Wellbeing

This obviously continues to be the first priority.

I would like to remind you about Kooth, which is excellent if your child needs somebody outside the home to talk to.



I have also attached official Public Health England guidance that might be of interest.

Please do not mistake any encouragement by us for your child to keep on top of their school work as running counter to this being a fundamental principle. We understand that there will be times when work has to take a back seat and the Easter break is a time to reset, recharge and refresh, with school work there merely as an option to fill a long day. Nothing extra will be set until we "return" on April 20th.

We would always encourage students to:

- Get plenty of exercise
- Read for pleasure (there are lots of good age-relevant book recommendations on the Internet)
- Consider taking up a new (indoor!) hobby

It is interesting to hear from some parents that their children are starting to get a little bored with social media (and their phones) and don't seem to be missing them particularly, being happier as a result.

Home Learning

Don't forget that we have a dedicated page on the website to keep all messages and documents about Home Learning in one place. I want to remind you that all teacher email addresses are in the "Home Educating Your Child" document – they are the first port of call if you have any questions about a piece of work.

As well as lots of praise for the activities that have been set, we have received a few constructive comments that staff will be considering on our return. In particular I have asked them to:

- Try to "chunk" the work into roughly hour-long segments either by setting separately on Class Charts or giving an indication about what they would be expected to do for each lesson, if a longer task is set.
- Try to set all work to appear on Mondays to allow students to plan their week ahead.
- Make it clear whether students need to submit work, or there will be other ways of judging success e.g. giving out mark schemes or exemplars to compare against.

We have been asked by a couple of parents if there is any intention to offer virtual lessons in the future. We will look at this but please understand that there are technical, logistical and fairness issues:

- Teachers are working from home and do not all have access to the right technology or have the correct expertise.
- Not all students would be able to access lessons for similar reasons.

That is not to say that it won't be considered, especially if the school's closure is for a very long time, but I just wanted to manage expectations for the short term at least. I have looked at what lots of other schools are doing and, apart from a few ad hoc arrangements, this is not yet a widespread response.

It is also worth noting that the BBC are going to unveil a massive range of resources (daily lessons, videos, quizzes, podcasts and articles) after Easter that could form part of a coordinated, national curriculum.

Finally, I would repeat the fact that you are doing a great job with this. Some of you have reported that you are not coping as well with directing the home learning of your child as you would have hoped. Please don't worry — anything is better than nothing and nobody is expecting you to replicate the job of a teacher or create a completely normal school routine!
